Research shows that most people turn to social media to help find friends and family during an emergency, which may be the best thing to do. The social media outlets are very proactive in helping in times of crisis. After a shooting at the Ft. Lauderdale International Airport, Facebook turned on its "Safety Check" feature. Safety Check allowed users to search for updates from friends in the affected area. Google has a similar feature, Google Person Finder.

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## **Staying Safe with Space Heaters**

Old Man Winter hit some parts of the country really hard during the last few weeks. Many people are using space heaters to stay warm, but space heaters can be dangerous when proper care is not taken. During the five-year period between 2009–2013, space heaters were the cause of two out of every five home heating fires. That's 40%! They were also the cause of four out of five home heating fire deaths—84%. Many of these fires were caused by people placing things that can burn too close to the heating element or by placing the space heater too close to things that can burn. 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# 'Hold on Tight!' Freezing Rain is in the Forecast

Winter is definitely here! Meteorologists in many parts of the country are predicting all sorts of potentially hazardous precipitation; snow, sleet, and freezing rain. Freezing rain can be especially dangerous. Why? When rain doesn't have a chance to freeze before it hits the ground but freezes on contact, you can't tell that it's going to be slippery. You don't know that it has frozen until you are already slipping and sliding on the ice-coated surface of the road or sidewalk. Freezing rain, because of its weight, is also dangerous because it can cause powerlines and tree branches to snap and fall.
